## **Under 10 Jaguars Manager's Report - 2021-22**

Lea Sports Jaguars ended their under-10s season having proved themselves worthy members of the top division of the Chiltern Junior Sevens league.

The season was not an easy one, divided into three distinct campaigns that started in the autumn top flight and included a confidence-building spell in winter group B, before ending in spring with them back amongst the league's most powerful sides.

It had taken a great deal of hard work and commitment from the boys to end the campaign back on top, with them always sticking to their principles of playing football in the right way – with total heart, commitment and resilience but also with respect for their opponents. The boys finished in May having won more than half their games and having scored more goals than they had conceded, only two strikes short of a century, with the end-of-season results line showing P27 W13 D3 L11 F98 A95.

It was brilliant to see the goals being spread across the team, with the defensive three of Rudy Alexander-Scott (6), Luca Wilson (5) and Tom Entwistle (3) chipping in 14 goals between them. The midfield more than contributed their share, with 43 coming from the regular three of Frank Stout (18), Jacob Mayes (18) and Sol Burgess (7). Up front, the forwards kept scoring, George Henry (21) pipping George Major (19) to the golden boot by only two goals. As well as finding the net, the regular front two worked hard to close their opponents down, stretch play, create space and lay on chances for others.

Of course, the Jags' success was built on the most solid of foundations at the back, with Rudy, Tom and Luca proving themselves an interchangeable three and always providing superb protection for the two goalkeepers, George Gelling and Warwick Thompson. The keepers were brave, resolute, made some cracking saves, and never let their heads go down during the tough autumn run. In midfield, Frank turned into a flying winger down the right flank, Sol always bamboozled his opposite number down the left and Jacob's tough tackling and lung-bursting effort gave the team drive in the middle of the park. George Robinson offered the defence added protection, breaking up play and looking to get the team on the front foot.

It would be easy to identify the team's 10-match winning streak in winter as the high point of the campaign, 27 goals raining in across three matches against Clophill, Sundon and Stopsley, and with George Henry especially enjoying himself in a purple patch of form with 11 goals in six matches. But most impressive was the boys' return to the top flight in spring, giving valiant performances in defeat to the league's top outfits Flitwick, Stotfold and Thunder, and often proving themselves a good match for their opponents for most of the game, but coming unstuck in one or two key moments. There was lots to build on for next season, with plenty of promise for another exciting campaign.

Thanks must go to a group of key people. To Phil Toyer for his expert coaching of the boys, to Steve Smith for providing everything the club needs and to Catherine Cardy for looking after the welfare requirements. A particularly big thank you goes to Rob Burgess for organising the matches, the training, the subs and marking the pitches. Jon Entwistle provided expert video clips of all the key moments and the parents are the nicest, most supportive bunch across the league. We're looking forward to doing it all again in September ... stepping it up with 9-a-side on bigger pitches. Bring it on ... the boys will do themselves proud.
